

Numbers help us understand the scope of the solutions we're pursuing. Individual stories help us understand the impact those solutions have in a young person's life. Here is 12-year-old Dani's story.

Dani* is a very young survivor of sex trafficking who was referred to Chelsea, an Organization for Prostitution Survivors advocate, by the court. She had been removed from her home after she was identified as a victim of an online sex trafficking ring. Dani has made incredible progress in her healing since being removed from her parents despite all that she has experienced. She has been attending school regularly, and meets weekly with Chelsea at the foster home where she lives.

The two of them create art together and sing along to 80's hits (her favorite). Dani has had challenges regulating her emotions and attempts to run away when she feels triggered. This is something Chelsea has been supporting her with in finding other ways to self-soothe that protect her safety and well being.

In one session, Dani looked at Chelsea and stated "I am a trafficking survivor. I am a survivor." Chelsea promptly responded with, "You are a survivor. A powerful strong survivor who can be and do anything she wants in this world." This was a monumental breakthrough for Dani in the process of identifying that what happened to her was not her fault. She has struggled with understanding that what happened to her should have never happened. This was a moment where she was able to see herself as a survivor and not someone who "deserved" this.
